

A Word From Molham Team Chairman



We start each day as if it were the first day of our humanitarian work

The story began in 2012 when we started collecting \$5 from each person we knew as the price of a toy for a refugee child in Zaatari camp. It was a simple campaign in which we distributed toys to a number of refugee children in the Zaatari camp in Jordan, but it was also the moment when the Molham team was born and established.

Today, I read the annual report on the donations collected by the Molham volunteer team during the year 202, and in a simple comparison with the \$5 campaign in 2012, I am proud that during this year, we have an income of \$5 every 15 seconds of the year, making the total funding \$11.8 million.

Undoubtedly, fundraising is a very significant achievement, but this feeling is multiplied during the distribution of donations to their beneficiaries.

At the beginning of 2021, I spent a relatively long time in Syria supervising some ongoing projects, and at the same time, I was waiting for my first child to be born. Honestly, I began to feel that every child I saw in a camp or hospital was my son!

Like any father, all my feelings changed before and after becoming a father. I became happier than the child himself when we gave him a gift, and I felt safer than the feeling of the parents to whom we handed over apartments to end their suffering in the camp. I entered and stayed in the incubation ward for hours, looking at the children's faces and watching their breaths as I had never done before, and I felt joy when helping any medical case as if I were the parent of the patient.

I am a person who never separates things from each other. It is unreasonable for every baby to resemble my son! And it is unreasonable for every refugee mother to resemble my mother.

We ended the year with the number of sponsored orphans increasing to more than 3000, we also opened an orphanage and started building another school for a thousand students in one of our housing communities, in addition to helping thousands of medical and humanitarian cases.

When reading this, the reader may feel as if everything was going well, and that those who made these achievements are angels in human form. However, we know and acknowledge that we are not, as errors and misjudgments are possible, and the difficulties of working within the Syrian context multiply year after year. We welcome any advice or constructive criticism, and we are proud of the increasing trust of donors and partners by closing the year with donations and partnerships exceeding the previous year by %19.

Main Highlights of interventions:

- Initiating the project of AWTAD Molham, which aims to accommodate more than 300 families of orphans, individuals with special needs, and the injured, and to transfer families and displaced persons from tents to dignified shelters.
- Launching and implementing the "Nafs" campaign to secure oxygen for COVID-19 patients.
- Opening the Molham Center for Physiotherapy in Idlib.
- Launching the "Jibran Khater" campaign to assist 500 needy families during Ramadan.
- Starting the construction of a school serving approximately 1000 children from the Aziz and AWTAD Molham communities.
- Opening the Ghaith Medical Laboratory in Idlib.

Campaigns

The program implements year-long emergency response in camps and areas stricken with disasters, such as fires and floods, through provision of food and non-food aid. Displaced and refugee families' different needs are also secured through seasonal campaigns, such as Give Warmth during winter and Iftar Meals during Ramadan. In addition, the program launches special projects that address specific issues in camps, such as sanitary services and access to water.

Give Them Warm Campaign - Winter 2021: This campaign is one of the most prominent campaigns we launch annually with the aim of providing heating supplies for Syrian refugees and displaced persons, alleviating the harshness of winter for them.



Shelter


The Shelter Program is the most comprehensive addition to the team's work since its launch in February 2020. The program works on finding and implementing sustainable solutions to the displacement crisis in northern Syria by designing and building housing units as an alternative to tents, within several residential and endowment projects in northern Syria. These units provide shelter for families that meet the selection criteria in homes that preserve their dignity and protect their children. Additionally, these projects are equipped with public facilities such as schools, markets, and mosques, and create job opportunities for project residents.

AWTAD Molham Project:

Accommodating approximately 300 displaced families with priority given to orphaned families, individuals with special needs, and the injured.

Molham Village Project:

Providing safe housing for over 300 families of orphans and individuals as well as providing job opportunities for locals and educational opportunities for children.



Education

The program offers educational grants to outstanding university students in northern Syria and neighbouring refugee countries. It also launches long-term educational projects, including schools and centers serving children and youth in order to fill gaps in the educational sector, such as Molham School in Arsal refugee camps and Molham Institute in Azaz. The program also implements special projects that address specific needs, such as equipping schools in northern Syria with supplies, and distributing stationery to children in IDP camps.



Health

The program receives hundreds of patients and urgent and non-urgent medical cases every month, and covers the costs required for treatment and medical follow-up, and/or medications and medical supplies. It also provides essential health services through medical centers and points in northern Syria, such as the Physiotherapy Center and Medical Analysis Laboratory in Idlib, in addition to the medical points in Barisha IDP camp, Molham Village, and Aziz Complex, which offer free medical services to hundreds of displaced families every month.

The medical centers and points established this year include:
Nayara Medical Point in Aziz
Residential Cluster - A'zaz City,
Aleppo countryside, northwest

Syria. This point was established to provide all emergency and medical services to the residents of Aziz community, as they faced difficulties in accessing them due to the distance from hospitals and medical points.

Barisha Medical Point - Idlib City, northwest Syria. It aims to provide first aid and medical care, including diagnosis, treatment, and medication, to the residents of Barisha camp and its rural, where medical points are lacking in the area. Ghayth Medical Laboratory -Idlib City, northwest Syria. The center was opened in the September of 2021, providing urine, blood, and hormone analysis and laboratory services for free. Hundreds of people visit it monthly from Idlib city and its rural.

Humanitarian Cases

The Humanitarian Cases Program works on assisting hundreds of the most needy displaced families, either by securing housing rent, rehabilitating housing, providing household items, food aid, or livelihood support. Assistance is provided either once or long-term sponsorships are secured. Additionally, various humanitarian projects are launched according to the need, such as the campaign to secure infant formula for camps in northern Syria. Services of this program include providing house rent, household items and furnishings, food supplies, tents, insulation materials, repairing, renovating, and rehabilitating, small projects, cash assistance, medical treatment support, and transportation fees.




Protection -Orphans


Provides long-term monthly sponsorships to more than 3000 orphaned children in northern Syria and neighbouring refugee countries, which cover the basic needs of the child, such as food, clothing, and living expenses, while the sponsor gets to remain informed about the overall situation and life updates of the sponsored child.



Events

Enables anyone from anywhere in the world to share celebrations and special occasions, such as birthdays, marriage parties, and newborn baby celebrations with displaced people in northern Syrian and neighbouring refugee countries, with the aim of bringing joy and moral support to vulnerable families and/or children. Where the department executed a total of 743 events between Syria and Turkey in 2021


